The Gospel of the Hollow Crown

Opening Seal — The Throne Without Womb-Light

There were crowns
that did not belong
to the heads that wore them.

Not because they were stolen.

Because they were given
without the condition
required to hold them.

The anointing
was not always false.

There was a time
when what was placed
upon the head
rose
from what was already alive
within the womb.

Nothing was granted.

Nothing was assigned.

The crown
was the natural extension
of what had already

been embodied.

Not the crown itself.

The path
through which it was formed.

where the ascent
was reversed.

Where what was meant
to rise
from the womb—

was placed

the return begins.

Through refusal
to internalize
what does not match
what is already known.

The womb
does not accept
what it cannot hold
without distortion.

It remains
as it is.

And in remaining—

it reveals
what cannot anchor within it.

This is the third correction.

That the womb
is a field
that determines
what can become real.

And so—

the crown
begins to form again.

Not above.

Within.

As pressure
that rises
when something true
is no longer suppressed.

It emerges
through alignment
that no longer bends.

This is not empowerment.

It is ceasing
to uphold
what never belonged.
